## Month 1 THE STORY SPINE

Once upon a time...

Introducing main character & setting

Every day...

Initial situation "baseline"-MC's everyday

Until one day...

**Inciting incident** 

Because of this...

Call to advernture answered. Things start to charnge.

More causality- results of change. (this can be expanded)

Because of that ...

Climax. Things come to a head.

Until finally...

Ending. Character arc fullly realized.

Ever since then...

## Month 1 STORY ARCHITECT

### In a notebook, jot down these key moments in your book

Opening image/situation/setup. This is when we set the tone and get to know your character. This part should hook the reader and get them to care.

Theme stated. The theme can be stated by another character, in dialogue for example. This will be central to the book and to its lessons.

Inciting incident. This is usually not created by the protagonist, but it changes everything for them. It forces them to react.

Debate. Your character is still lying to themselves. They should hesitate before answering the call to adventure- if they don't, the stakes and challenges are too weak.

Decision is made - embarking on journey. An irreversity e decision is made.
Your character must start readying themselves for the changes that are coming their way.

Exploring the world / false victories. This is where your character feels that maybe this new world is all right, after all. There may be a bit less tension- they have a few victories but they are still not evolved enough to attain their true goal.

Turning point- Antagonistic forces reemerge. At this point it becomes evident that the stakes are still there, that all is not OK. The tension and conflict ticks up again.

All is lost / dark night of the soul. Some variation on this is necessary. Without this low point, your character will not be forced to change, learn, and grow. This portion forces an uncomfortable but inevitable solution.

Possible solution is found /climax. This solution is something that would not have been available to your character before, as they were. They have new strengths and new tools now. Ending. This shows the new situation for the protagonist. It does not have to be happy but it needs to be satisfying. They have changed in crucial ways.

## **HOW TO WRITE A HOOK**

**DO...** Start with a suprising statement or situation.

DOVIT. Drop the reader into the middle of the action without quickly helping them to form an emotional connection to the main character.

**DO...** Remember your title is your first hook.

**DON'T...** Start with too much description or with infodumping.

**DO...** Start with a moment where your character's life is about to change.

**DON'T.** Make it too confusing as to what is happening. If the reader is not yet invested they might stop reading.

**DO...** Set the mood, introduce the tone, and start to ramp up the stakes and suspense.

## Month 1 STORY, CONFLICT & TENSION

A story is about a character trying to achieve something they want and/or need.

Conflict is a struggle between opposing forces-Your main character, with their wants or needs, and the obstacles that stand in their way.

#### Conflict examples:

Someone wants the same thing as your character.

Someone wants the opposite of your character.

Your character is torn between their morals and desires.

The environment is making it difficult for your MC to succeed.

Tension emerges from the consequences of failing to achieve those wants and needs.

This tension drives the plot, escalates throughout the story, and creates suspense.

# Month 1 INCITING INCIDENT The inciting incident is an event that happens in relation to your protagonist

at the beginning of your story to get the plot moving in a new direction.

What is the beginning situation for the main character?	What is untenable about that situation?
What makes the situation is hard to change?	What is preventing your MC from attaining their true goal at this juncture?
What are 5 things that could happen that would force your MC to change their status quo?  1.  2.  3.  4.  5.	How can you introduce some urgency into the resulting situation?
How will your character be motivated	& changed irreversibly by this incident?

## **CHARACTER ARCHETYPES**

The Lover

Follows their heart.
Rash, impulsive, maybe naive.

The Magician

Has a special power or is on a power trip. Good or bad.

The Explorer

Curious. Maybe too curious.

Maybe to the point of self destructiveness.

The Innocent

Naive to a fault. Often needs saving. Can serve as a foil.

The Hero

Idealistic, overconfident, ego driven.

The Outlaw

Could be virtuous but is a rebel and a lawbreaker at heart.

The Sage

They ahve the knowledge but are slow to act. May decide to only share part of their knowledge.

The Creator

Creates things in the story whether ideas or things that impact plot.

Can be good or bad or both.

## THE PROTAGONIST

Their actions drive the plot of the story.

## THE ANTAGONIST

They are a force opposing the protagonist's efforts to attain their goal

DRIVEN

HAS a PROBLEM to SOLVE
RELATABLE but not LIKABLE
UNIQUE STRENGTHS
COMPELLING FLAWS

STRONG VALUES or IDEALS

Has a SECRET / BELIEVES a LIE

HAS SOMETHING TO LOSE / GAIN

MAY HOLD A MIRROR to the MC

## Month 1 ULTIMATE CHARACTER WORKSHEET

- -Which accidents of birth impacted them? (Think: parents, class, location, events...)
- -What was important about their childhood? (Happy/unhappy, illness, parental relationship, education, disability, upheaval, home, expectations)
- If they were to name the 3 most impactful events of their early life what would they be and why?
- -Describe your character physicallly- but only the details that impact their sense of self/their abilities/ their relationships/ the STORY.
- -Does something crucial change for your character between childhood and when your story begins? (They have lost someone, their circumpstances have changed, they have a dfferent sense of self)
- -Is there a disconnect between your character's exterior or others' perception of them & their interior?
- -What are the key things about your character when story begins? (How they present themselevs, their work, their interests, their goals, their relationships, their fears)
- -What does your character want? Do they know what they want? Is what they want good for them?
- -Are there behavioral parrterns in your character's life? Are they helpful or not? Why do they exist?
- -Strengths/wesknesses? Strengths that are weaknesses? Weaknesses that are strengths?
- -Interesting quirks for "texture" in your book: Aesthetic/style, favorite foods/music, pets, etc.

#### From Idea to Published in 6 months

### **ULTIMATE WORLDBUILDING WORKSHEET**

- -What are the details of the landscape that impact the story? (Difficult terrain, drought, plentiful game, natural boundaries, natural resources, plants/animals, climate & weather...)
- -Has the environment changed/ is it changing/ are there environmental issues /does your MC come from a very different place?
- -What are distances like and how do people travel? Is travel safe or not? Is there city and country?
- -Which speces inhabit your world and how do they interact? Are there hierarchies? How densely populated is it?
- -What is government/religion like and how is the world organized administratively? Are there states, territories, kingdomes...and are they at war or at peace?
- -What are key beliefs, laws, and traditions and are any of these problematic or helpful?
- -What are culture and education like? What are some key professions/ Are there classes and inequality? How do people act, dress, interact? ARe there mths and stories?
- -What are some of the key laws and rules of conduct? What is forbidden? If there is a magic system, make sure to express the cost, the limits, who can use it and how...
- -What do people eat and drink? Is food generally safe and plentiful? Are there meal traditions?
- -What are family/social units and interactions like? How does this impact your story?
- -How is the technology, what are some of the things the world has/doesn't have that are important? If this is a historical book or one set in a historical-ish fantasy setting, make sure to be consistent.

## **GENRE**

ROMANCE Focuses on a romantic relationship (usually between 2 people) They are kept apart for most of the novel- lots of tension but they get together at end. Sub-genres include historical, paranormal, and western.

SCI FI

Focuses on universe & worldbuilding and technology. Usually set in the future. Lots of sub-genres in SciFi such as Steampunk, Space Opera, Afrofuturism...

FANTASY

Focuses on kingdoms. Many supernatural elements, mythology, and magic. Take cues from historical settings. Sub-Genres include historical, gothic, fairy tale...

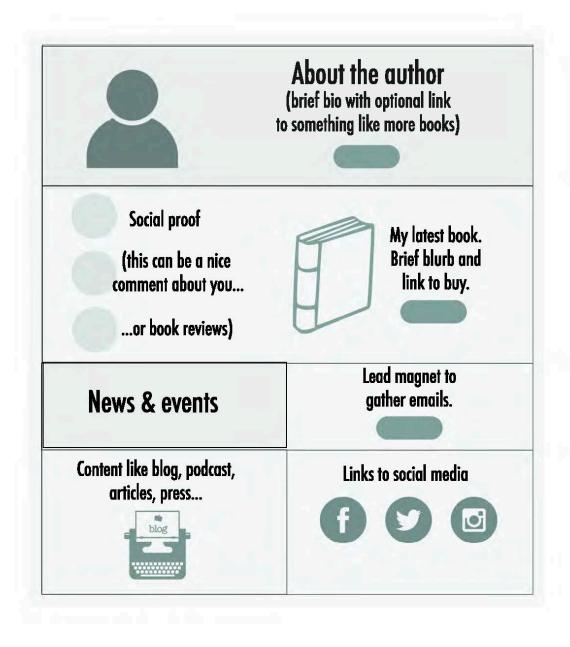
MYSTERY The classic "whodunit." There is a major question that must be answered. Sub-genres include police procedural, Noir, and cozy mystery.

THRILLER The main character is in jeopardy. High stakes, high suspense, often high action. Setting is integral to the plot. Many cliffhangers throughout.

YOUNG ADULT Often a coming of age story, can be Sci-Fi, Fantasy, Romance, literary, etc. Also New Adult.

//TFRARY Focuses on the human condition, emotions, and inner journeys. Can be historical or women's fiction. Usually these books win more awards but sell more copies.
